INTERVIEW with DAVE BOFF, Roselle Catholic Director of Development

What was the genesis of writing the book now, at this time?

I always enjoyed reading and writing and was an English major so it was always something that intrigued me but I guess I finally had the time on my hands to do it so I just started to write.

What role did Roselle Catholic play in your foundation of success especially in your early years?
